[10] conducted an empirical quantitative study aimed at exploring the impacts of employee integration, maintenance and motivation, and technology and AI adoption on employee retention within the UAE Abu Dhabi police force. Additionally, the study investigated whether technology and AI adoption moderated the relationships between employee integration and retention, and maintenance and motivation with retention. The study's theoretical foundation was the resource-based view theory, guiding a conceptual framework comprising four variables: employee integration, maintenance and motivation, technology and AI adoption, and employee retention. Data was collected via printed questionnaires from 371 employees and analyzed through structural equation modeling. The findings revealed that employee integration, maintenance and motivation, and technology and AI adoption significantly predicted employee retention within the UAE Abu Dhabi police force. However, the moderating effects of technology and AI adoption on the relationships between employee integration and retention, as well as maintenance and motivation and retention, were not found to be significant. The study suggests that investments in employee integration, maintenance and motivation, and technology and AI adoption could enhance employee retention in the police force. The research underscores the need for further investigation to comprehensively understand the relationship between technology and AI adoption and employee retention.
